

ARTIST'S VOICE:

I have always enjoyed painting though I haven't painted for a number of years now, so when I was asked to participate in this project for the calendar I was very happy, as it gave me time to be creative and paint an important aspect of my Nyoongar culture.



BUNURU

This month is the second part of the Summer season and the hottest time of the year, with very little rainfall. Nyoongar people who lived inland sourced their water from hidden rock holes and people who lived closer to the coast would hunt for fish with traditional fish traps. When the water in the swamps dried up kooyars (frogs) would dig deep holes in the mud and wait for the water to return

Waterhole 2015

ARTIST'S VOICE:

Myself and my son really enjoyed working on our piece of art because we learnt quite a lot about the life of frogs in their natural environment and how they survive the heat of the Summer by borrowing TITLE: Frog at the into the mud of waterholes to wait out the dry hot Summers until the rain comes - and we enjoyed working on the piece together as part of a whole group of families participating in the calendar project.



BUNURU

As the hottest time of the year, Nyoongar people who lived inland, especially those who had their camp sites in the hills area; Darling Range Escarpment, had to be watchful for lightening strikes that could set the thick bushland on fire but the Elders always prepared a safe place for the people. The karak (red-tailed black cockatoo), black with white spots and a fire-red tail of feathers, migrates through Nyoongar country in high numbers, especially in Whadjack country (the Perth region) during this time.

DJERAN

At this time of the year, the weather becomes cooler but many Nyoongars stayed near the coast to hunt for fish - different species were plentiful all year round. There were many types of bush tucker available, especially bulb foods like the spicy blood red sand plain bulb, whose seeds were ground into a type of flour and when mixed with water made a damper which was cooked in the coals of the campfire.



DJERAN

Migrating birds fly from different parts of Nyoongar country to nest in the lands of the Whadjak people (Perth region) but the black swan nests in this area all year round. The black swan mates for life and the Nyoongar name, koodjark, identifies it's bright red beak.



MAKURU

This month is the first part of the Winter and Nynoongar people would return to their camping grounds to prepare for the colder months of the year where heavy rains and cold nights were not far off. Camp sites were made secure, bushtucker and medicines were collected and stored and traditional tools were made stronger. There were many types of bush food available but yonga (kangaroo) was a main staple diet.

MAKURU

Nyoongar people all through Nyoongar country prepared for the colder months of Djilbar (August to September) - the time of heavy rains and very cold nights. Though food was still plentiful, Nyoongar people stayed close to their camp sites where many of the trees were filled with a bush food favourite - the widgetty grub.



ARTIST'S VOICE:

As a Sister Kate's Home Kids Aboriginal Corporation Director, I'm proud of the cultural programs we deliver to our Aboriginal families, and this project is a great opportunity for our people to creatively express themselves around their cultural heritage. I also see art as a powerful healing tool for trauma recovery and reconciliation.



DJILBA

This is the second part of Winter; the wettest and coldest time of the year, where hard frost covers the ground and heavy fog covers gullies and low-lying rivers. Nyoongar men hunted yonga (kangaroo), goormoorl (possum) and weitj (emu). The skins and feathers were used for clothing, bedding and carry bags for bush foods, medicines and tools. Women collected many types of berries, nuts and seeds.



ARTIST'S VOICE:

I enjoyed working on our artwork as it gave me a sense of peace and well being – I felt very calm whilst I was doing it. Doing the work also provided me with an opportunity to bond further with my son, so if there are any programs like this one in the future, we would like to participate in them.



DJILBA

In the coldest month of Winter, Nyoongar women looked after the children and old people while the men hunted for yonga (kangaroo) and kept the camp fires burning. They also gathered seeds for damper and dug in the ground for bush potatoes and carrots — this is a time of plentiful food. All traditional Nyoongar women (in the past) made their own digging stick which they carried in their dilly-bags when walking country to gather food.



KAUBARANG

In this month, the days are drier, warmer and longer with more movement away from camp; walking country to gather bush foods and medicines as well as hunting animals such as tortoises and freshwater crayfish were a daily ritual. Emu and mallee foul eggs were gathered in areas that bloomed with the many different wildflowers.



KAUBARANG

There are a wide range of different birds that rest in this season, when baby birds are born — with many nests perched high in tall gum trees. The kulbardi (magpie) wooble their bird-song, heralding in the warmer weather. Reptiles (snakes, rock lizards and goannas) surface from hibernation — all animals, bird life and wildflowers are waking up to the sun and the warmer days.


